

So, if you ever find yourself in Paris, I encourage you to embark on your own croissant adventure. You won't be disappointed.

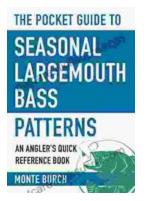


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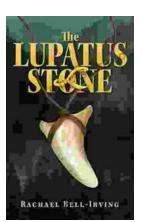
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
